Gianna Nino-Tapias is from Eastern Oregon and Washington, where her family worked as migrant farmworkers, native to la Mixteca Baja of Oaxaca. She started working in the fields when she was 13 years old, which inspired her to dream of better health conditions for her community. She graduated from high school as the first Latina/Indigena Valedictorian of her high school, and headed to university on a full-ride scholarship at Stanford University as a Gates Millenium Scholar. There she completed several community health research projects locally in East Palo Alto, and spent multiple summers with the Community Health in Oaxaca program, as well as a summer with Puente a la Salud Communitaria in Oaxaca working on Indigenous food sovereignty for local youth. She was co-chair of the Natives in Medicine group during her undergraduate time.

She then completed a Masters degree in Epidemiology and Clinical Research at Stanford University School of Medicine and completed a thesis analyzing weight status impact on oral poliovirus vaccine shedding in rural Mexican communities and Zimbabwean communities with Dr. Yvonne (Bonnie) Maldonado and Jonathan Altamirano. She then enrolled in medical school at Stanford University School of Medicine where she was a mentor through the Stanford American Indigenous Medical Students for the undergraduate Natives in Medicine group. She received the Stanford Medicine Wang Award for Excellence and Leadership in Family Medicine.
